Enrollment for Clinicals (all except Ireland)

- Summer 2024: 3-credit N436 summer course fulfills clinical hours
- Fall 2024: Enroll in 1-credit N436 Seminar (class 1 day a week, sim, labs)
- Spring 2025: Clinical will be inpatient at Madison hospital, cannot be peds or community/pop health (cannot repeat settings)

Why enroll in an immersion?

Different experience, Women's health/peds/global focus, easier load in Fall (no clinical hours & reduced credits), room to add other course(s)

Recommendation from Prior Participants

Independent, self-directed, adaptable, comfortable with unstructured environments, open to uncomfortable/new situations








Program Learning Outcomes:

- Understand the principles of Evidence Based Practice (EBP)
- Describe the types of research methods most commonly used in nursing research
- Connect research paradigms, research designs, and types of research questions
- Identify key steps of the EBP process and apply them to a research problem arising from reflection on nursing practice
- Differentiate between the different types of sampling, data collection, and data analysis research methods
- Understand the nature of evidence produced by different research approaches (separated into quantitative or qualitative designs)
- Recognize the fundamental building blocks of research including concepts, variables, and types of data


Study themes:

- Classroom instruction and field experiences






IAP: Malawi- The Warm Heart of Africa

- 13% of children orphaned





SoN: Guatemala

Details:

- Coordinated through Friends of San Lucas and with local health promoters
- Provide sustainable care responsive to specific needs of the communities

Typical Day:

- Organize supplies for the day, travel to clinic site, hold clinic in the morning and afternoon
- Work in groups to screen patients, conduct histories and physical examinations, present patients to the providers for evaluation
- Attend evening session to discuss topics related to patient care, global health, social determinants of health, and other topics of interest

Details: 4 students, Peds Focus, Instructor-led

Dates: Few prep days 6/10–14, at camp 6/16–21 and 6/23–28

- Stay at camp Sunday 9am until Friday 2pm
- Weekend Can stay or leave camp

What do you do: Work in teams & with camp nurses to provide daily cares for campers; learn how to work with young adults and children with special needs; gain an appreciation for respite care for caregivers; assist in activities to get well-rounded experience

What's included: Food & lodging, transportation by SoN



SoN: Girl Scouts



Girl Scouts Mission: Girl Scouting builds girls of courage, confidence, and character, who make the world a better place.

Camp Ehawee (pronounced E-How-E)

Location: Mindoro, WI (2.5 hours North, near La Crosse)

Population: girls Kindergarten to 5th grade (ages 5-11), some 6th-8th grade (ages 12-14)

○ Rotation #2: 7/14 – 7/26


Rotation #3: 7/28 – 8/9

What do you do:

Students interested in women's health, obstetrical, and mother/baby specialties go into the largest birth center in the state of Wisconsin. Rotating through opportunities in OB triage, antepartum, labor and delivery, postpartum care, and NICU (shadow day), students spend time at the bedside working with their instructor, registered nurses, and other staff to provide care to mothers and babies. With a focus on patient advocacy, health equity, and the changing medicine within obstetrical and midwifery care of women in Dane county, nursing students experience firsthand the ever changing and high acuity role of a women's health nurse.
